Irvine General Plan

- The Irvine General Plan is the master plan for development, improvement, and preservation of our community.
- California law requires all cities to prepare a general plan to guide long-term development.
- Irvine incorporated in 1971, adopted its first general plan in 1972, and has updated the plan over time.
- The Irvine General Plan guides physical character and location of Land Uses, and the preservation and enhancement of Irvine's quality of life.







Why update the Plan

- Since the last major update of the plan in 1999, Irvine has continued to mature.
 - Annexed 20 square miles
 - Population increase of 100,000+
- State laws have significantly changed, and general plans must be updated to keep pace with new regulations.
- As community needs change, priorities and services must be adapted to maintain and improve quality of life.

Outreach was conducted through a series of workshops, a survey and one-on-one contact at City events to inform and engage local residents and other interested parties regarding the General Plan Update.







Outreach Feedback


- Three community workshops offered residents, business, and other stakeholders an opportunity to learn about the project.

 - for playing Irvine trivia.



Survey Details

- The survey was administered from April to October 2016
- Surveys were available:
 - Online through the City's web site
 - As a printed hard copy, distributed at various events and available at City Hall
- A total of 1,370 people provided feedback through the survey
- Questions pertained to priorities for Irvine's future




Geographic Distribution of Respondents

Geographically, some areas were over-represented, but most areas had some representation


95% of respondents **live** in Irvine





What are the most **important goals** for the City in this list?






Irvine Planning Framework (Draft)

Three Levels:

- Overall vision for Irvine intended to be general, reflecting where Irvine aspires to be in 30 years
- Guiding Principles that span multiple topics and cross over different elements of the general plan
- Objectives that give form to the vision and serve as an anchor for chapters in the general plan







Irvine Vision (Draft)

Irvine is a **safe** and **secure** community renowned for the finest quality of life. Our City is an **diverse** community, offering quality neighborhoods, housing, and services that **support people of all ages and cultures**. **Parks** are a valued asset for recreation purposes; **preserved open space resources** reflect our commitment to the environment. **Trails** connect our villages, open space and parks, and commercial centers. An efficient circulation pattern and **range of transportation options** allow people to travel easily throughout the City. We value **education**, **culture** and **arts**, and **community services**; our child-care centers, schools, institutions, and diverse programs reflect our commitment to these values. Our robust **economic centers** thrive on **innovation** and provide **well-paying jobs** and the fiscal resources to continually reinvest in our community.

Objective 1 (Draft)

Land Use, Design, and Preservation

Balance of carefully designed land uses that are complementary and benefit the community, that preserve and protect neighborhoods, and that accommodate buildings of exemplary architecture and thoughtful site design of lasting value.







Objective 2 (Draft)

Transportation and Mobility

An efficient, safe, and diversified transportation system that offers a variety of attractive, well-designed, and safe options for drivers, as well as for cyclists, pedestrians, and transit riders.



Objective 3 (Draft)

Housing

Ample choice of accessible, affordable, and desirable housing in well-preserved and amenity-rich villages that provide a high quality of life for our children, adults, families, and seniors of all ages.







Objective 4 (Draft)

Parks, Recreation, and Human Services

Support community health and wellness with recreational resources and well-maintained parks, quality education and lifelong learning, and civic involvement; encourage public and private partnerships to maximize programs and services.







Objective 5 (Draft)

Culture and Heritage

Value and protect our cultural, historical, and paleontological resources; preserve historic sites and neighborhoods; and support a robust expression of arts and culture in education, the local economy, and the built environment.





Objective 6 (Draft)

Open Space and Conservation

Preserve hillsides, open spaces, vistas, canyons, and waterways that frame the city, link to prominent ridgelines and community destinations, and provide open spaces and habitat for a diversity of wildlife.








Objective 7 (Draft)

Economic Development

Foster a vibrant and resilient economy and strong job base, benefiting from local education systems, community resources, and economic development policy, and maintain a strong tax base to support infrastructure and City services.





Objective 8 (Draft)

Public Services and Infrastructure

Ensure that sufficient water, sewer, utility, and other infrastructure systems are available that contribute to quality of life and health and safety; collaborate with public, private, and other agencies to provide or share in maximizing services.



Objective 9 (Draft)


Community Safety

Safeguard the community from natural and humancaused hazards in order to secure public health, minimize disruption to the economy, and protect people and business from property and other loss.
